What if you could combine your mastery of math and science with your sense of humor to give scientifically sound answers to ridiculous questions? Would you start a webpage called What If?

That's what Randall Munroe did. The site, [What-If.xkcd.com](http://What-If.xkcd.com), is actually a section of his main site, [xkcd.com](http://xkcd.com). The main site focuses on his cartoons, which I can't say that I'm a fan of. They're geared too much toward a certain segment of the population so obsessed with technology that I'll just refer to them affectionately as nerds. Plus they're not drawn very well.

### No stupid questions

But his What If? site is engaging, funny, interesting and educational. It's a simple site with a simple premise. Readers submit absurd questions and Mr. Munroe, using

advanced mathematical equations, principles of physics and simple sketches, answers them in a humorous, easy to understand fashion.

Each page on the site is devoted to a single question. Previous and next buttons allow you to go back and forth through all of the questions he's answered so far. An archive link at the bottom of the page lets you browse previously answered questions.

Reading the questions and answers quickly becomes habit forming. Mr. Munroe uses a wonderful blend of logic and humor in his answers that has you marveling at the wonders of the universe one minute and laughing out loud the next.

### Wise guy

No matter how silly the question is, Mr. Munroe attempts to answer it. His solutions often reference the research he does, which is pretty impressive. It seems that being really smart isn't just knowing a lot of stuff, it's also knowing where to find the answers to a lot of stuff. He displays some Spock-like logic just figuring out how to find the answers to the questions.

The site has a simple, effective design. The questions, answers and sketches are

displayed over a background that looks like graph paper. Besides the navigation links, there are also links to his main site and his store. Finally, there's a link to submit questions.

What If? is a silly site where you can easily spend a lot of time browsing through the crazy questions. But it won't feel completely like wasted time because you will actually learn a thing or two.
